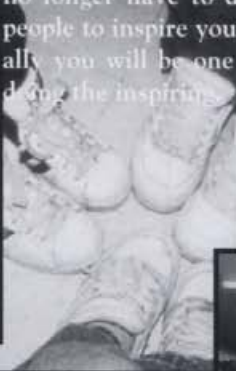
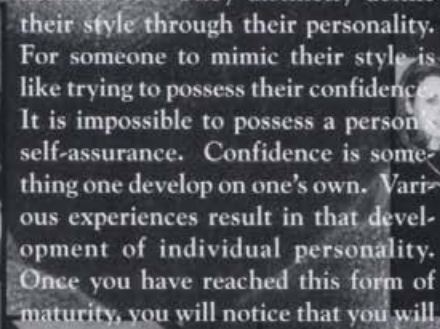
# Are you STYLISH?
